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

seeds or fruit frees. For frees, &c., send in orders ear BENJAMIN BANNAN HOW TO RAISE TURKEYS. A correspondent from Michigan, Outober 4 gives the following as his mode of raising to keys. It is his opinion that a farmer can rais

pound of fowl easier and cheaper than a pound of pork. He says: "Heretofore I have been unfortunate in raising turkeys, but this scasfu I adopted a different mode-a plan of my own invention-by which I havo been very successful. Dihers may have adopted the same course, but not to my kn wholes. "Young turkeys are apt to die before they attain the age of three weeks. I came to the c nelusion that the fatality among them was caused by vermin, heavy feed, and cold, damp weather. My method this season has been this :- Take the eggs of the first laying and set under hous; the second laying let the turkeys hatch. Two or threadays before hatching sprinkle the nest and the fowla themseives with sulphur. When the young were hatched, I took a little sulphur, gunpowder and lard, mixed, and greased their heads and nocks, to keep off the vermin while the young brooded. If it dees not remain on, in eight or ten days put

n another cont. "Mode of Feeding .- I took equal quantities of wheat, bran and Indian meal, and wet with sour milk; or lappered milk, with a good lot of fine cut schives once in two or three days in with it, and fed them till a month or six weeks old; then "sen the brans, Feed them early in the merning o keep them from rambling in the dew. "Such has been my method of feeding and mir. gement, and I have lost only two out of faratched. Ducks managed in the same way-inthree by accidental causes out of thirty fire niched. One, only died while young. Chick. as like manner, with greased heads and sulpher-! nests-lost threp in about sixty. This is my ode and my success."-Baltimores fun.

LAND IN ENGLAND AND SCOTLAND. Some of the English papers express themselves uzzled to account for the fact that the rent of orm lands in Scotland is much groater than in England and Ireland. The comparative differsuce in regard to Ireland may be accounted for by bad farming, but it is denied that this is so in a gard to England, as there is no deficiency in this respectwith the English tenanty. The enigma sought to be solved by attributing the larger nts in Scotland to the superiority of the soil. bough the evidence of this does not seem to be

ally satisfactory. The rent of farming lands in Scotland is cerainly high beyond anything we have ever bead. An advertisement in the London Times of the sale of a farm four miles from Berwick, is note-\$3700 a year, on a lease of 14 years, or about \$13 an acre. Pasture land on Carnwarth Moor, 20 miles from Edinburg, and 550 feet above the level of the sea rents at \$15 per acre. In Peebleshire the average rent is over \$17, an acre. In the neighborhood of Edinburg it reaches \$27 an acre, and some as much as \$34 an acre for purely agricultural purposes.

The rents of farm lands in England are much ower. Within fourteen miles of London farms io not average \$19 per acre: indeed in some parts they do not much exceed \$7 an acre.

GUANO .- The Mark Lane Express gives the folowing rules to be used in the application of Guino, and considers them, from experience, to be useful as a guide to those farmers using rtilizers. Ist. Guano is best applied inlamp or showery weather. 2d. Guano should not generally be put iin grass land in the spring later han April. 3d. When Guano is applied to arable land, it should be immediately mixed with he soil, either by harrowing or otherwise. 4th. When the wheat is sown very early in the autumn, less than usual amount of Guano should at that time he applied, and the rest in the spring. The wheat, otherwise, might become too luxuriantand be injured by subsequent frosts. 5th. Gunno, and artificial manures in general, should be put on the land only in quantities sufficient for the particular crop intended to be grown, and not with the intention of assisting the succeeding one .-Each crop should be separately manured. 6th. Guano, before application should be mixed with at least five or six times its weight of asheg, charcoal, salt, or fine soil. 7th. Guano should on no account be allowed to come in direct contact

THE TARTER SHEEP, imported from China into he United States within the last five years, some of which were exhibited at the late U. S. Fair, are beginning to attract attention—not from any particular value attached to their product of week, breed. An ewe has been known to drop as many as five lambs at a birth, and fifteen in the space. of sixteen months. For the shambles they are said to be excellent. They are claimed, also, to be of "good size, fatten easily and mature rapidly." In the present high price of mutton, such a breed would seem to be especially valuable and desirable ant least we shall soon have an oppor-

tunity of knowing to what extent. The Patent Office at Washington has recently received rome efegant specimens of "Malaga grapes" from California. They are large, full and luschus; the fruit of the vine introduced in-to that country a hundred and fifty years, ago.— It is the opinion of those employed in the agricultural department of that office, that our country at large can be supplied with those grapes from California, at a cheaper rate, than those from Malaga or elsewhere out of the United States can now be furnished.

Recives. CURE FOR FOOT ROT .- Take one-half pound pulverized, to which add one gill sulphuric acid, and three gills, salt water. Mix the whole theroughly together in an earthen, or, glass vessel, and apply immediately to all the feet, whether diseased or not, and where diseased, the loose part of the hoof should be cut away, and the sere cleansed before applying; and if you want to make sure of it, catch every sheep in the fleck and apply it to their feet. After a week or two go over your flock again, and you are rid of the foot rot fer that time or until they get the infec-

tion again. KEEPING SWEET LATABUES. The best plan we have ever tried to keep sweet potatoes for family use, is to pack them in layers integood boxes of sand and a layer of polatoes on that, with sand strewed among them; then another layer of sand supporting a layer of potatoes as before. The
