To the Honorable, the Judges of the Court of Over and Terminer and Quarter Susiens of the Peace for the The Grand Inquest, enquiring for the body of the bouty of Schoylkill, September Sessions, 1868, respectively report:
That they have acted on torty-even bills of indictment, ite Frison, belonging to the County, by order of the Court, and Gund it in very good condition and under excellent management.

The County offices they find generally in good order, with the exception of the Frithonotary's effice, in which they would respectfully recommend an enlargement, by the removal of the partition on the West side of the office, and the erection of an additional Fire proof; as we find it is present Fire prior crowded to mach an extent as to prevent the proper keeping and care of the books and papers belonging to the office.
