In the mass of valuable statistical matte which makes up the Mining Review of California, for 1863, our attention has been struck by that which has reference to the coal mines there, and the amounts obtained from them. The writer of the review speaks intelligently and intelligibly upon the topic. Although gold has been the chief product of the State, is so now, and will doubtless, long continue to be for when the large and statement. to be—for when the bars and gulches and pockets are exhausted the quartz yet remains—the importance of coal is not underrated.

The writer says:—"Second to no other production, in its bearing on the permanent prosperity of the State, is the article of coal. prosperity of the State, is the article of coal. As an agent for promoting our mechanical and manufacturing interests, and rendering our other mineral resources available, it has the strongest possible claims upon our attention. In connection with the state description or already found upon the coast of the North Pacific, it becomes doubly important, since, with the facilities it will afford for its manufacture, we may seen here. ford for its manufacture, we may soon hope to supply ourselves with this very coully but indispensable article. The economical gen-eration of steam, whether for the purposes of

eration of steam, whether for the purposes of navigation or the propulsion of machinery, will probably go further than any other one thing in deciding the question of national supremacy. In comparison with a perma-nent supply of cheap fuel, gold and silver are commodities of altogether secondary im-portance. Better far that our mines of the precious metals should utterly fail than that Strong, it should be determined we had only a limited supply or an inferior quality of coal on this side of the confinent." These conclusions are just, and are reached Hearty, columns of the report show that there is no ground for apprehending that the alternative will become desirable, although the present supply is not all that could be wished for supply is not all that could be wished for.
The only places where coal is now obtained in marketable quantities for California consumption are Bellingham Bay, Washington Territory, and Mount Diablo. Their yield, though fair, and sufficient for domestic fuel, as well as for generating steam, is inferior to

Small veins and signs have been found at a great number of places in the State, and in neighboring territories. Alameda county has a heavy deposit, which is expected to yield a good article when greater depth is attained. In Montrey, Sonoma, and Tulare counties it has also been found; while fifty tons have been gathered from Ne-

reka, 15,000 an aggregate of 68,100 tons: which, added to the former mines, gives a total annual State supply of 85,100 tons. The Mount Diable mines have thus far been

en products Pennsylvania certainly surpasses its rival as markedly in the product of coal. The value of the California gold crop was \$41,689,077 in 1861; \$47,471,378 in 1862; and \$50,297,349 in 1863. The amount of coal produced in this State during the same periods cannot be exactly given, since the returns of that which has an outlet at Pittsburg are incomplete and deficient. The reported anthracite product of 1862, was, however, 7, 040,095 tons, and that of 1863, 9,420,135 tons. In the same years the semi and bituminous product was 1,359,716 and 2,166,985 tons. This gives a total of 11,387,120 tons in 1863, or an excess of 2,586,499 tons over 1862. Or an excess of 2,380,493 tons over 1852.—
Calculating the value at \$3 per ton, the worth
of Pennsylvania's mining for 1862—in one
portion of the State only—is \$34,761,360.
Calculating the value \$5 per ton, the result \$57,935,600. That is to say, the coal crop of Pennsylvania in 1863 was worth more than 638.251. Perhaps the unrecorded exports of coal from Pittsburg may serve to offset the unknown amounts of gold smuggled from and retained in California without publication. The question of coal supply is growing in importance along the whole western coast of the country with each day.
