LETTRE FROM HARRISBURG.
MARCH 3, 1864.
MESSIS. Epirons:—On Monday evening, I March 3, 1864.

Messus. Entrons:—On Monday evening, Dr. St. Clair, the Senator elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Harry White, arrived in the Senate chamber under escort of the Union Loague of this city, with music, flags, and a transparency. The election returns having been handed in, Dr. St. Clair took the usual oath of office, and it was then declared that the Senate was organized and ready to proceed to business. The Democrats, however, refused to recognize the organization until a Speaker was elected, by resisting the passage of every bill offered. No one not conversant with legislation, has the most remote idea of the manner in which even a minority can hamper legislation, if so disposed. For instance, a Republican moves the Senate proceed to the consideration of a bill under the rule. Immediately one of the minority calls for the yeas and nays, and the motion carries. Then follows a motion to postpone for the present, which is defeated. A motion to postpone to some fixed time, and another to postpone indefinitely, follow in turn, and meet a like fate, when a motion to adjount comes from the other side. On all of these motions the yeas and nays are called, and there is such a consumption of time, that unless something is done, the Senate cannot pass half a dozen bills a day, even under the lash of the previous question.
