E. B. French, Second Auditor, Washington,
D. C.; and in all cases post-paid, and he will,
on receiving a letter from the claimant, send the necessary blanks and instructions how to the necessary blanks and instructions how to fill them up, &c., and such is his determina-tion to assist those who give the required ev-idence of their relationship (which entitles his attention) to receive the claim. But to agents he will not give any blanks.

In order that Mr. French may decide who is the proper person, the letter must give the nearest survivor-in-law, and he, she, or they should make the application; as: First, widow; second, children, collectively (if minors, by guardian); third, father, (if a fit person, but if drunken or otherwise unworthy of mother: fifth, brothers and sisters collectively; sixth, next nearest relatives or heirs, by executors or administrators. The bounty

will not be paid to any representatives below the second degree (children), unless resident of the United States. Neither will bounty be paid on the will of deceased. the auditor will send word to that effect, and at the same time indicating which of the relalives named by the applicant is. On the return of blanks before mentioned, they are filed away in their regular order with those of the same State, and settlement, will be made in order of date of death.

Richmond, by the last census, had a population of 38,000 souls, but the great influx of civil and military officers and refugees from other parts of the State has probably raised it to a much higher figure. It is situated at the head of tide-water, at the lower falls of James River, about 150 miles from its crossing each other at right angles. On Shockoe Hill are the State Capitol and

A canal has been built, around the falls, and above them there is navigation

for two hundred miles. The James River and Kanawha Canal, intended to extend to Covington, is completed for two hundred Richmond has very extensive railroad communications, being the terminus of five roads running to Predericksburg and the Poto-

Epiron Miners' Journal: Having a day of rest, or rather part of a day, I gladly devote an hour to report to you as per my promise, the progress and success which has attended this army in its present campaign. Since our leaving Chat-tancogs, May 4th, we have had pretty constant employment, on the march, and in perfecting ar-rangements to secure the desired success to our rangements to secure the desired success to our arms. This move was most successfully accomplished, our forces passing via. Trickum and Villanow, through Snake Creek Gap to Sugar Valley, at the head of the Gap, and near the town of lossoca. After feeling for the enemy it was discovered that their whole army was in our front, strongly fortified, and determined to make a desperate fight. A broper disposition of the troops was made, and on Saturday, at 12 M., the line of battle advanced on the enemy. Shot and shell flew thick and fast 'till dark, when the contest ceased, broken at intervals during the night by discharges of musketry, and artillery. The battle however, was not resumed 'till dawn of next day. Sunday, when again the dread messengers of death werehurled against the foe.
