



The Kearsarge and Alabama Reports of Capt. Winslow to the Secretary of the Navy.

U. S. STEAMER KEARSARGE,

Cherbourg (France), June 21, 1864. Sin: I have the honor to report that toward the close of the action between the Alabama and this vessel, all available sail was made on the former, for the purpose of again reaching Cherbourg. When the object was apparent, the Kearsarge was steered across the bow of the Alabama for a raking fire, but before reaching this point the Alabama struck Uncertain whether Capt. Semmes was not using some ruse, the Kearsarge was stopped. It was seen shortly afterwards that the Alabama was lowering her boats; and an officer came alongside in one of them to say that they had surrendered, and were fast sinking, and begging that boats would be despatched

immediately for saving of life. The two boats not disabled were at once lowered, and as it was apparent the Alabama was settling, this officer was permitted to leave in his boat to afford assistance. An English yacht, the anora assistance. An English yacht, the Deerhound, had approached near the Kearsarge at this time, when I hailed and begged the commander to run down to the Alabama, as she was fast sinking, and we had but two boats, and assist in picking up the men. He answered affirmatively, and steamed toward the Alabama, but the latter sunk almost immediately. The Deerhound, however, sent her boats, and was most actively engaged. 




