Saturday, July 30, 1864. THE WAR FOR THE UNION! The Army of the Possesso—The Bebel Baid—New Order for Dismaies purpopers. A movement is making in the Army of the Potomac, but its object and progress are not yet made public. On Tuesday afternoon the rebels made a movement which appeared to be an attempt to flank Butler or get in his rear by way of Harrison's Landing.

There is some news from the raiding ground of the Rebels in the 'Shensindosh Valley. Gen. Crook appears to have pushed the Bebel advance out of Martinsburg on Monday, but whither they are gone is unknown. Col. Mulligan was killed; leading a charge by his Irish Brigade; but Gen. Averill, was only slightly wounded. The opinion appears to prevail that the Bebels have gone off, taking with them the rich harvests of the valley. Their whole force is now estimated at from \$5,000 to \$0,000.

A Baltimore dispatch sates that our forces still hold Harper's Ferry, and are not even menaced. Adam's Express Company are forwarding grode there. Gen. Kelly occupies Martinsburg. The disasters said to have followed Crook's retreat are not confirmed.

Some further developments from the great northwestern campaign are telegraphed from St. Louis. It seems that an Order called the "American Knights," has been formed. General Sterling Price is Supreme Commander of the southern States, and C. L. Valleddigham Supreme Commander of the northern States. The doctrine of the order is to inaugurate a rebellion in the north, sieze, arrest, kill or capture civil, and military authorities, &c. The names of the members of the Order, and full information concerning the whole scheme, is said to be in the hands of the government, and will probably be given to the public shortly.

The fate of Col. Mulligan is still ansettled. The statements published regarding the order of "American Knights" in Missouri is compiled from evidence taken by the Provest Marchal of Missouri during some months.

The loyal Pennsylvanians in Weshington are making strangements to return home to vote at the special election on Tuesday next.

Telegrams from Gen. Sherman report all quies since the battle of Friday last.

RECOURING IN THE REBEL STATES GOVernor Curtin has issued an Order for the execution of the provision of the new Conscription Law, authorizing the recruiting of nogroes in the rebel States, to be credited on the new call for 500,000, to the States which may procure their enlistment. Five agents are to be appointed from Philadelphia, two from Allegheny county, and one from each of the other counties of the State. The Governor says he has no money at his disposal for the payment of these agents, and suggests that their compensation be fixed and paid by the counties or districts which they represent; in which case they will be appointed upon the nomination of the Commissioners of such counties, or Committees for the Recruitment of Volunteers. If no compensation is thus provided, appointments will be made by the Governor on application. Schuylkill should move at once in appointing agents to recruit n Rebel States for the County. Chester has already sent her agenta.

THE FINANCIAL SITUATION. - A letter from Washington to the Independent, dated "July

16th, 1864,"says: The financial situation looks more hopeful: Mr. Fessenden can compel success, if he will steadily refuse to issue any more legal-teners. The currency will become more valuble, the premium upon gold will grow small and the expenses of the Government, will be materially reduced. The speculators of all kinds are combining in an endeavor to drive nore legal-tender notes. They desire further inflation of the currency, to further their private speculations, and care nothing for the interests of the Government and country. It is to be hoped that Mr. Fessenden will stand firm and refuse to print more money. If he will offer six per cent. (in coin), he can sell five hundred millions of dollars worth of bonds before January. No more legal-tenders—and a popular loan will carry the country safely through its financial troubles. If the new Secretary has the resolution to resist all entreaties to the contrary—come from what quarter they may—he will succeed.

Turkes have rarely changed with the socalled Democratic party of this county. The ate Convention proved it. Formerly it was the practice, said a Democrat a day or two since, to put an Irish candidate or two on the County ticket, to secure the Irish vote. Now: the Irish element largely predominates in the Democratic conventions, and having control of the nominations, places an American or two on the ticket to make sure of the American-Democratic vote of the County. Rather "rough" on the standing candidates for Assembly, etc., in this Borough and elsewhere; who are compelled to turn the grindstons while their Irish friends grind their axes. In re-nominating Strouse for Congress the Irish exhibit a religious toleration as rare as it is emarkable.

THE Secretary of the Treasury gives notice that subscriptions will now be received for freasury notes payable three years from August 15, bearing 7 3-10 per cent. interest in currency, and convertible at the option of the holder at maturity into five-twenty bonds bearing six per cent. interest in gold, The amount which he thus appeals to the people to loan to their Government is \$200,000,000. It is not only the privilege but the duty of every loyal citizen to respond to this appeal. and to invest large or small amounts, according to his means, in these National securities. The country needs—urgently needs—the money, and the subscriptions ought to be prompt as well as numerous.
