

In this country it has been a rare sight to see women engaged in field labor except at the South, where woman's labor has light highly apereciated, especially for certain kinds of work. The present scarcity of laborers leads many to employ women in field abors. During the month of June thou. sands have found profitable employment in weeding carrots and mangels, setting out cabbages, tobacco, etc., lending a hand in the hay field, and perhaps in the corn and potato fields too. They are paid 50 to so cents a day, and we have no doubt they cam it well. At least their employers are entire. ly satisfied. We should be very sorry to see women of America subjected to the cruel drudgery of the women in Europe, yet no one can look upon this out-of-door labor, if as likely to work any thing but good to those

who participate in it.
