In business he was industrious and person vering, prompt and punctual, candid and up-right. His caution guarded him against rashness; his enterprise impelled him to make progress; his energy stimulated him to perseverance; and his sound judgment guided him safely through all the breakers of business. Such was his knowledge of men and things, his control of himself, and his adherance to justice and right that he was enabled to deal with hundreds of villagers and country people behind the counter, and with scores of miners at the mountains, without slimulating a quarrel or losing the confi-dence and respect of either a customer or a
