

Prisoners.

THE BEREL ARMY DISPERSED. Sr. Louis, Oct. 27. The following is received ST-Lous, Oct. 27.—The following is received from reliable sources. Our forces have been driving Price rapidly since Sunday: At the last accounts he was twenty-live or thirty miles southeast of Fort Scott, his army routed and dispersed. On Tuesday we had several fights with him between Mound City and Fort Scott, in all of which he was badly whipped, losing 1500 prisoners, and ten or twelve piecessod artillery: Major General Marmaduke and Brigadier General Cabell are among the prisoners, with several colonels and other officers. other officers.

He was again attacked yesterday morning, a short distance north of Fort Scott, and driven pell mell in a southeasterly direction. He burned two hundred wagons yesterday to prevent them being captured. Nothing is stated about the loss on either side; but there seems to be no doubt that Price's army is completely demoralized and scattered. The telegraph is working to Fort Scott, but nothing has been received of to-day's operations, except that our forces are still in vigorous pursuit.

General Steele, with a heavy reinforcement, is at Fort Smith, with the probable view of contesting Price's enterance into Arkansas.

The rebels were chased all Sunday night, and constant forthing kept in the constant of the content of t Hood on the Back Track. Our felegraphic accounts respecting the progress of the campaign in the cotton States say that Hood had got far into Alabama on his retreat, and was pushing for Gadaden, while Sherman had reached Galesville, Ala., in pursuit.—Hood's army was reported to be destitute of both shoes and food, and his retreat is therefore, toward his base of supplies with Macon having been severed by Sherman at the very first movement from Atlanta in pursuit.

SEMMES is afloat again, having left England on the 9th inst., in the bark Laurel, which is: intended as a tender to the Ranger, a steamer supposed to be lying at Madeira. The Laurel carries out guns and ammunition for fitting out a privateer with eight officers and one

hundred men, most of them belonging formerly to the Alabama. THE PROVOST MARSHAL MURDERED IN IOWA-More Proof Positive of Conspiracy.—Fifty of the gang that murdered the two draft officers in Poweshick county, Iowa, on the lat instant, have been arrested, subjected to preliminary examination, and committed to the Davenport jail to await trial. One of them was wounded, thought himself dying, and made a free confession, declaring they were an organized rebel company drilling as State militia, and looked forward to the invasion of Missuri as their special time for action. He was arrested by Govenor Stone in person.
