On the 17th inst., the Pennsylvania Coal Company will pay a dividend of 7½ per cent. As many of the mines in this State are getting below water level, the deeper they go the more sulphur is naturally expected, and the more accidents are liable to occur. Many places have in consequence taken fire by gas and otherwise, causing loss of life, and the mines to be shut up or drowned out to quench the fire. Now as all the mines that are below water level have a column of pipes to pump the water from the bottom of the slope, the operator may put a cock in the first pipe, above the working-barrel, and prepare three inch leather hose to answer the length of the gangway, and height of the breast, and 20 or 30 feet of two inch gas pipe to attach to the fur-

It was our impression on loaving the Wyoming Valley and Region that we had examined our most valuable and perfect coal field, but after a careful examination of the Mahanoy, we are constrained to qualify our opinion. Therefore, until we go further and see more, we are bound to place the Mahanoy foremost among our "Diamond Vallies" and leave to time the question of supremacy between it and Wyoming. At Wilksbarre we find one hundred and lea fet of coal! stratified in tenvions, from five to thirty feet thick, and near Ashland we find one hundred and the fet! in the same number of viens, ranging through Ashland we find one hundred and toenly-five feet in the same number of viens, ranging through the same degree of thickness. WASHINGTON, NOV. 10

SERENADE TO PRESIDENT LINCOLN—GREAT ENTHUSIASM—SPEECH OF THE PRESIDENT. The several Lincoln and Johnson Clubs of the Dis-rict of Columbia called on President Lincoln to-night, and gave him a serenade in honor of his re-e There was in addition an immense concourse of specta-tors of both sexes in front of the Executive Mansion.— The firing of a field-piece was of frequent occurrence, adding to the excitement of the occasion.

The President appeared at an upper window, and when the cheers with which he was greeted had ceased, spoke as follows:
"It has long been a grave question whether any Govcan be strong enough to maintain its existence iff great emergencies.

'On this point the present rebellion has brought our Republic to a severe test; and a Presidential election occurring in regular course during the rebellion, has added not a little to the strain. If the loyal people united were put to the utmost of their strength by the rebellion, must they not be partially paralyzed by a political war among themselves? But the election was a necessity. We cannot have a free government without elections; and if the rebellion could force us to forego or postpone a national election, it might fairly claim to have already conquered and ruined us.

"The strife of the election is but human nature prac-"The strife of the election is but human nature practically applied to the facts of the case. What has occurred in this case must ever recur in similar cases. Human nature will not change. In any future great national trial, compared with the men who have passed through this, we shall have as weak and as strong as silly and as wise, as had and as good. Let us, therefore, study the incidents of this as philosophy to learn wisdom from, and none of them as wrongs to be reveneed. (Cheers.)

fore, study the incidents of this as philosophy to learn wisdom from, and none of them as wrongs to be revenged. (Cheers.)

"But the election, along with its incidental and undesirable strife, has done good too." It has demonstrated that a people's Government can sustain a National election in the midst of a great civil war. (Renewed cheers.) Until now it has not been proven to the world that this was a possibility. It shows, also, how sound and how strong we still are. It shows that, even among candidates of the same party, he who is, most devoted to the Union and most opposed to treason can receive most of the people's vote. [Applanse.] It shows, also, to the extent yet unknown, that we have more men now than we had when the war began. Gold is good in its place, but living, brave, patriotic men are better than gold. [Cheers, and other demonstrations of applanse.] But the rebellion continues, and now that the election is over, may not all, having a common unterest remitte in a common effort to save our common country? (Cheers.)

"For my own part, I have striven, and shall strive, to avoid placing any obstacle in the way. [Cheers.] So long as I have been here I have not willingly planted a thorn in any man's bosom. While I am deeply sensible to the high compliment of a re-election, and duly grateful, as I trust. to Almighty God for having directed my countrymen to a right conclusion, as I think, for their own good, it adds nothing to my salisfaction that any other man may be disappointed or pained by the result. (Cheers.] May I agk those who have not differed with-me to join with me in this same apirit towards those who have? And now let me close by asking three heary cheers for our brave soldiers and seamen, and their gallant and skillful commanders."
