

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While visiting the grounds of a friend in Astoria, we were struck with the excellence of his paths, and found that they were made with common coal or gas tar, and sand. The surface for the path is first graded and cover. ed with an inch or two of sand; it is then flowed with the tar and then a covering of sand or gravel is placed over this. In a few months the whole forms a hard mass as firm as stone. The walk when first made is a lite. tle vielding, but it may be used at once is. king care that any inequalities be remedied before the work finally hardens. A walk made in this way is very firm, will not wash when made upon a slope, requires scarcely any repairs for years, and-what is a most important advantage-does not allow a weed of any kind to grow upon it. It is stated that a barrel of tar will make about 50 feet in length of walk, four feet wide. In those localities where good gravel cannot be had this enables one to make satisfactory walks from any coarse sand at a little cost. A correspondent in Fulton County, N. Y., inquires if the use of tar for walks has been patented. If it has been, we have not heard of it; we know that it has been in use for walks, gutters, and similar purposes for several years; a patent would hardly be given. - American

Agriculturist. How to Choose Eres .- In patting the hands round the egg and presenting to the light the end which is not covered, it should be transparent. If you can detect some tiny spot, it is not newly laid, but may be very good for all ordinary uses except boiling son. If you see a large spot near the shell, it is bad, and should not be used on any account. The white of a newly-laid egg boiled soft is like milk; that of an egg a day old is compact, tough and difficult to digest. A cook ought not to give eggs two or three days old

COMMON CRULLERS OR TWIST CAKE. - MIX well together half a pint of sour milk, or buttermilk, two teacupfuls of sugar, one teacupful of butter, and three eggs, well-beaten; add to this as teaspoonful of saleratus dissolved in hot water, a tenspoonful of salf, half a nutmeg grated; and a teaspooned of powdered cinnamon; sift in flour enough to make a smooth dough; roll it out not quite a quarter of an inch thick; cut in small oblong pieces; divide one end in three or four parts like fingers, and twist or plait them over each other. Fry them in boiling lard. These may be cut in strips, and the ends joined, to make a ring, or in any other shape.

WASHINGTON CARE. - Beat together one and half pound of sugar, and three quarters of a pound of butter; add four eggs well beat en, half a pint of sour milk, and one teaspoonful of saleratus, dissolved in a little liot water. Stir in gradually one and three-quarters pound of flour, one wineglassful of wine or brandy, and one nutmeg, grated. Beat them well together. This will make two round cakes. It should be baked in a quick oven, and will take from

fifteen to thirty minutes, according to the hickness of the cakes. Chumpers .- To a pint of warm milk and water add a tablespoonful of good yeast and two eggs well beaten; mix with these by degrees as will make a thick batter; then heat very small frying-pan, rub it with a little outter, which will spread over the pan.-Watch the under side by raising it with a

fork, and when brown turn it. FRENCH JUMBLES .-- One pound and a half of flour, one pound of sugar, three quarters of a pound of butter, three eggs; dissolve teaspoouful of soda in one-half cup of milk add this, also one nutmeg, and roll out the dough, and cut into small cakes of any shape

and bake them in a quick oven. PLUM PUDDING .- Mix 2 cups of flour, 1 easpoonfuls of cream of tartar, 2 cups sour milk, & teaspoonful soda, I cup of raisins, I of dried currents, 1 teaspoonful each of cinnamon and cloves. I cup each of molasses and sugar. Boil about 11 hours and serve

Sponge Griddle Cake. Take 1 quart of mush, while warm add I pint of butter-milk, l of sweet milk or water, I teaspronful of soda, stir in flour until it is a batter, let it rise until morning, then bake on the griddle, and MUFFIRS. -Take two pounds of flour, two eggs, two ounces of butter melted in a pint

of milk, and four or five spoonfuls of yeast: mix them together; beat thoroughly, and set to rise two or three hours; bake on a hot HARD TIMES FRUIT CAKE. - Two cups 6 dried apple soaked over night, chopped rather coarse, three cups of molasses; one egr. two-thirds of a cup of butter, one teaspoon-

ful soda, all kinds of spice, flour as you would cup cake; this will make two loaves, A Good Christmas Pudding .- One pound of flour, two pounds of suet, one pound of currants; one pound of plums, eight eggs two ounces of candied peel, almonds and mixed spice according to taste. Boil gently

for seven hours. SPONGE CAKE .- Mix 6 eggs, - thoroughly beaten, with 2 cups sifted sugar, 2 cups sifted flour, I teaspoonful cream tartar i teaspoonful soda, and a little salt.

BAKED INDIAN PUDDING .- Mix 3 pints Indjan meal, I of wheat flour, 2 of sweet milk 1 of sour milk, 1 cupful of molasses, 1 tablespoonful of salt and 1 teaspoonful of saleratus. Bake 3 hours.

Botten Ster Pudding -One cup of such chopped fine, one cup of raisins, one cup of molasses, two cups of flour, one cup of milkf a little soda. Cinnamon and cleyes to your taste. To MAKE CHILI SAUCE. -Six tomatoes two

onions, three peppers, one tablespoonful of sugar, one of salt, one and one-half cup of vinegar; stew them soft. .GINGER SPONGE-CARE. One cup of mo-

lasses, one cup of butter, two cups of sugal, four eggs, three cups of flour, one cup milk abda, and ginger.
