In making a layer, a branch is partly buried in the earth, and it remains more of ess in union with the parent plant until it makes roots of its own. In propagating by cuttings, the branch is completely severed from the parent, and planted in the ground to strike root and form a new individual. In grafting, a cutting is planted in another tree, with which it unites, and uses roots already provided, instead of making roots of its own The cion or cutting used in grafting has several buds upon it, while in budding, a single bud is employed. The future growth from the cion or bud partakes of the character. good or bad, of the tree from which it is taken; and, though the fruit may be some-
