The falling off in the trade continues large, and unless some efforts are made to start the trade at bottom prices," the falling off will reach a million tons before there is much re-action. The second reduction in the prices of tolls and transportation on the Lehigh gives the Lehigh and Lackawanna Regions advantages over the

trade from this Region ranging from 60 to 80 cents per ton in the New York market. The present cost of transportation from Mauch Chunk to New York is \$3.38 per ton. From Schuylkill County, via. Canal, the present cost is \$4 05 per ton-difference, 67 cents per tou. It is alleged that the less cost of lateral railroad transportation in this Region will make up this difference. This is not the case, because the higher price obtained for Lehighi Coal in the market more than covers this difference.

With so great a disadvantage Schuylkill county must be content, under existing circumstances, to furnish only such Coal that the other regions cannot, and of course our tonnage must continue to diminish. So far the Delaware and Raritan Canal Company have made no reduction in their rates. The present cost of tolls and tonnage reaches \$1 05

per ton. The Boatmen on the Schuylkill Canal have made another reduction from \$2 95 to \$2 75, 19 cents per ton. If a further reduction of, say 50 cents, could be effected between the Delaware and Baritan Company and our transporting compinies, say 25 cents each, we believe the trade would take a start, and then Schuvlkill county would be enabled to throw her quota of Casl into the market. We are aware that this is a question of dollars and cents with our carrying Companies -but so long as they have provided themselves with rolling stock sufficient to carry over 100,000. tons of Coal a week to market, would not then interests be subserved better by an increased trade of several handred thousand tons at a low er figure, which would also increase the othe. traffic of the road in carrying a larger number of passengers, and increased quantity of food and merchandize, &c.
