THE DEMEANOR OF THE PRISONERS. Daring the night before the execution none of the prisoners slept save Payne and Harold, both of whom had a sound, quiet rest of about two hours. The parting between herself and daughter was borne with more fortitude than was expected of her; and whilst the latter swooned sway, and was carried to an adjoining apartment senseless, Mrs. Surratt appeared to rally in strength for the moment. Soon again, however, she lost strength; and when taken from her cell to the scaffold, she had to be simost literally lifted and borne along by the officers. THE LAST DAY,

In the lot south of the prison, and surrounded by a wall thirty feet high, the scaffold was erected. The structure is about seventy feet from the prison near by say, thirty feet distant, were four freshly due graves, and beside them four large pine coffins, coarsely constructed.

She gazed up at the horrid instrument of drath, and her lips were moving rapidly as in prayer. She was assisted upon the scaffold, and seated in a chair near the drop. She gazed upon the noose, which dangled in the wind before her face, and again her lips moved as if in prayer.
