THE EPISCOPAL CONVENTION. - The coming General Convention of the Episcopal Church in October next, will be one of the most important in the entire history of the American Episcopal Church. According to Rev. Dr. John Cotton Smith, in his rely to the Bishop's Pastorial, an effort will be made to introduce a new canon, intended to allow to the clergy of this Church more liberal relations with those of other denominations. DEATH OF BISHOP POTTER.—A dispatch from San Francisco announces the death of Bishop Alonzo Potter, on the 4th inst., in that city. Bishop Potter was a native of Duchess county, N. Y.; graduated at Union College; became a tutor in the College in 1819, and was elected professor of natural philosophy and mathematics in 1821. He was ordained in the same year, and invited to a rectorship in Boston in 2826. In 1834 he was made Vice-President of Union College; was chosen Bishop of Pennsylvania in 1845. Bishop Potter has contributed many works to the literature of the country. Among them the "Principles of Science applied to the Domestic and Mechanic Arts," "Political Economy, its Objects, Uses and Principles Conis sidered," 'The School and Schoolmaster.' and a number of discourses, charges, addresses, etc. He was born in 1800. His death will be universally regretted. No man was held in higher respect, and none whose authority in educational matters was more

The President's action in the case of the conspirators has surprised the timid and the conservative. It was expected by this class that he would take a month in examining the proceedings of the court, and that he would commute the sentences of all except Payne. Instead of this he acts with great boldness—and decision. He decided, after a moment's thought, to throw the entire responsibility upon the court by accepting everyone of its findings, and ordering its sentences to be carried into execution. This too, in the face of a loud protest against the jurisdiction of the court from every opposition press in the country! After this action of the President, I conclude if Jeff. Davis is brought in guilty by a civil court that the President will not interpose to save him from execution. Such is the opinion of Mr. Johnson's intimate friends here.

This boldness with the conspirators startles the opposition leaders here who had begun to claim the President as their friend and the exponent of their principles. The Hon.
