The very greatly increased expenditures for the year 1863.64 and '55 are accounted for to a very great extent by the increased cost of all the articles, required for the nsc of the institution, and as most of the srticles required, are those in the price of which the greatest advance has taken place. (many of the principal articles having advanced in price from f-ur to five hundred percent., and some in a still greater ratio.) It will be seen that the Directors in making their estimates for the year 1863 and 1844, might easily be mistaken as to the amounts required for those years, and consequently their estimates being too low, they found themselves in debt at the commencement, of the year current the sum above stated.
