OTES AND SUGGESTIONS FOR THE MONTH. Cows.-Farrow cows, that are to be fat ened in the fall, should be dried off at once so that they may get in good condition before cool weather. It is folly to think of fatten. ing an old, farrow cow while she is milked To dry a cow off in the shortest time, mile only enough to relieve a painful distention of her udder. This will soon prevent the secretion of milk.

CALVES. -- Wean calves gradually. Restrict heir allowance to one teat per day. Then allow them to suck only part of the milk in one teat. After a few days longer, let them suck only once a day for a week, then once two days for a week; then once in three days. By this time they may be weated with little disturbance from either dam or call, and without growing poor, as they always du when weaned abruptly.

Colts. Spring colts as well as calres should be weaned generally in August. Con. fine them in a small, clean enclosure, where they cannot run much; and let them such twice a day; then once; then once in two days; then once in three days. See that colts and calves do not lack a good supply of clean water and good-grass, or fine hay, and Cons. -Indian corn is now too large to al.
