Seek to make the book disappear as much as possible, and bring out the thought. We need not particularize; the judicious teacher will adopt such expedients as the particular case may require.

A rapid, indistinct utterance requires that the pupil have frequent exercise in pronounc-ing words singly and even in measured time, coupled with free breathing and whatever

means will give self-possession and deliberateness.
See that whatever is read is thoroughly understood. Better a single sentence thoroughly and correctly read than several pages ironed over. Omit pieces of questionable utility, whether on account of the sentiments they contain, or of sulty construction, or because presenting elocutionary difficulties, for which the pupil's previous training has not prepared him.
