



OBJECT LESSONS. At a meeting of the National Teachers

Association, in Harrisburg lately, a report presented by a committee consisting of Dr. Scars and others, was read by Prof. Greene on the subject of Object Teaching. This is one of the most interesting points now being considered by progressive Teachers. A lady who had taught by it in Oswego exhibited the practice of it before the Association.— Taking a class of young children picked up in the streets of Harrisburg, she began by bolding up an apple and asking what it was; they all exclaimed "an apple." She then asked what they could tell her about the apple. One would say that it had a stem, another pointed out the eye, but did not know what to call it, another the skin, another the color. Then it was cut open, and the pulp and the seeds were discovered, and the uses of the different parts, explained. Then the different terms used to describe an apple, and it parts were discussed, their meaning explained, the pronunciation and spelling properly fixed in the mind of the children, and all in connection with the object. This is called object teaching, and the advantages claimed for it are many and important. It is, for instance, the natural method of teaching. It begins with an object, and from that leads the mind itself back to consider and recognize the impressions produced by it upon the subject. If, on the other hand, you teach a child to read and other hand, you teach a child to read and use words it does not fully and clearly understand, its knowledge becomes superficial, and it becomes contented with a very superficial and imperfect knowledge of any and all subjects. No doubt this is by far the most interesting method of teaching. The objects which excite pleasure in a child's mind it will ask and convertible. ask and answer questions upon, without weariness or inattention, for a much longer subjects in which it has no interest, and no

knowledge whatever at the beginning. Indeed this alone is in the proper seuse of the word education as distinct from instruction.
