of the United States is now in PRESS, and will be issued as soon as the printers can get through with the work. It will be a large volume of over 500 pages, illustrated with 200 fine engravings and a handsome colored or geological map of the Anthracite coal fields. We are now preparing a set of statistical taoles, showing the number of collieries, the coalbeds worked by each, the length of mining track, of power used for breaking coal, for holefing, for sumping, and the aggregate power in the Anthracite regions. The number of men and boys, em ployed, the amount of coal produced per head and the capital invested in mining operations.

We have succeeded in collecting the necessary data with but few exceptions, in all the coal regions except the districts about Pottsville and west of Pottsville, and these we have partially canvassed. It will be impossible to visit all the collieries in these districts at this late date, but we have sent brief circulars to them all, and we hope the operators will be kind enough to respond. We have data enough on hand to justify us in estimating the remainder, but in justice to ourselves, the accuracy of our work, and the operators themselves, we ought to have the necessary information from each.
