





TRUANCY AND SCHOOL VISITATION. The evils of truancy are many and varied. It is not our present intention to note the causes of this evil. The love of approbation is a leading motive to right performance in children. What will John or Mary think? or, Will my parents know of my anisdemeanor? are questions the student asks himself very frequently before attempting to do wrong. If a boy or girl knows that a register of daily attendance is regularly kept in the school, and that it is open to the inspection of parents and directors at all times, they very naturally inquire before absenting themselves from their school, whether it is at emselves from their school, whether it is a all probable that they may examine this daily record. The fear of being found out in wrong doing, and being punished for it, will influence him strongly to act rightly. For this purpose also, a class coll should be kept by every tencher, showing the attendance or by every teacher, showing the attendance or non-attendance at every recitation, and also the student's proficiency in each study every day. When he knows that at each lesson the teacher marks his recitation, he will not only endeavor to be ready and correct in ans-wer, but will be anxious to be present at every

performance of his class, that he may have no "black marks."

But of what benefit will all this be, if parents make no inquiries as to the attendance, deportment and habits of study of their children? children? Parents should visit the schools Here is an incentive to study and regular attendance. If a student knows that his father or mother is in the habit of visiting the school, how anxious he will be to show to them his abilities and standing as a scholar. He knows not at what hour his father may visit the teacher, and he would feel much abushed to hear him talking of his visit in abasined to hear him tutating of his visit in the evening if he had been absent during the day. When pupils are the first in the class, they feel proud to have their parents and friends know it. A Visit to Mr. Lincoin's Grave.

The correspondent of the Chicago Republican, who has accompanied General Grant in his trip through the West, says:

"We went this morning (September 13) to Oak Ridge, and some day we hope to give a detailed account of that wild burial ground. It is about two miles from the city, and consists of a tract of land of about eighty-eight acres, which is in future to be considered as the Spingfield burial ground proper. The remains are still unburied, and lie in the reception house, just as they came from Washington, watered by the tears of the nation. A guard tent is pitched opposite to this house of the dead, on a rising knoll, surrounded by trees. Three sentries guard the sacred remains night and day, and the stone doors are kept open, so that the air may circulate freely through the place. An iron gate protects the remains from a close intrusion, although one can see the two coffins—those of the father, and of the little son, who was carried here from Washington with him, to their final resting place.
