From Mine Hill I passed through a tunnel more than two-thirds of a mile long, and coming down the Little Schuylkill, returned to Mount Carbon, having made a circuit in one day of a county that contains more mineral wealth than any other of equal area on this globe. From this central haven of mineral wealth the world has drawn the last year more than four millions of tons of coal. The county of Schuylkill now contains as population of more than one hundred thousand people; when I first knew it it did not contain more than three thousand people. Its exports certainly did not amount to one thousand dollars a year, but its growth can be leosely measured by my telling you that the coal Schuylkill county sent to market last year amounted to more than tweety millions of dollars. At the beginning of the Rebellion which has been as successfully put down, the first companies of troops that came to the belearness of capital of our country were gived in Potsville.
