THE LATE FIRMDISH MURDERS IN PURLL DELPHIA.—The murderer of the Dearing fami ly, in Philadelphia, Anthony Probat, the man who was employed by Mr. Dearing, has crime, but says that he had an accomplice. Probat is now in confinement in Moyamen

sing Prison. The funeral of the victims took place Saturday last. The Ledger says:

At an early hour on Saturday the crowd began to gather in the neighborhood of Thirteenth and Chestnut streets, and it so locreased as the day; advanced
that long before the funeral procession moved. Thirteen streets was almost impassable, while many of
the neighboring streets were in a like condition.—
Every possible incility was given to view the bodies,
and at one time a line formed outside of the house
extended to Chestnut street. Visitors furnished with
tickets had easy access to the house, and had a full
opportunity to see the remains, all of which were
handsomely clothed and coffined, and the faces of
which were plainly visible by the light of the candleburning at the head of the first range, and of the
chandelier over them. The spectacle was a most sad
and solemn one. The deep cuts and scars which the
murderous axe had inflicted were still plainly visible
on the heads and faces of most of the victims, though
all that could be concealed were hid from view. The
intense feeling which the scene caused in the bos im of
some of the spectators found vent in a flood of tears,
and none were so insensible to it as not to show a
saddened expression of face. The husband and wife
were side by side, and the babe was next to them.
Then the other children. Miss Dolan and the apprentice boy were propely placed. The silver-plates on
the coffin lids designated the names of each, as follows:
Christopher Dearing, died April 7, 1866, aged 38 Saturday last. The Ledger says:

The prisoner appeared to be much depressed, and
was affected to tears when his relatives in Germany
were alluded to. The murder of the Dearing family
was again alluded to, and during the conversation
Probst said that he killed the boy while he was at
work near the hay stack, and that he (Probst) went
up behind the boy and drew back the axe to strike
three times before he had the heart to do it. Probst
also spoke again about the killing of Dearing and his
place and said that the man who was with him stood also spoke again about the killing of Dearing and his niece, and said that the man who was with him stood behind the carriage and struck Dearing as soon as he alighted. He also stated that he helped to carry the bodies to the barn, but still insists that he killed no one but the boy. A shirt belonging to the prisoner was found in the house yesterday. It was very bloody, and Probst stated that the blood got upon it while he was helping to remove the bodies. A hammer with blood on it was also found in the barn. A man was arrested on Saturday night, who, it is said, called at Lickfield's on Thursday evening and asked for Probst. He is still held for further examination.

LICENSE ACT.—The following Act to fur ther regulate the licensing hotels, inns, averns and eating houses, in this State, was adopted by the Legislature at its last session: AN ACT further to regulate the licensing of hotels, inns, taverns and eating houses, in this Commonwealth.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That it shall be lawful for the several courts of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, to hear petitions in addition to that of the applicant, in favor of and remonstrances against the applicant, in favor of and remonstrances against the applicant, in favor of and remonstrances against the applicant, and also to examine in court of them for a license to keep a hotel, inn, tavern, entired house or restaurant, and also to examine in court or by deposition under oath, the signers or any of them, to the petition of the applicant for any such license or other persons, and if any such court shall be satisfied that such hotel, inn or tavern, is unnecessary for the accommodation of strangers and travelers, or that the applicant for license to keep a hotel, inn, or tavern, or exting house, or restaurant, as the case may be, is an unfit or improper person to receive the same, then said court may refuse to grant such license, and the first section of the act of fourteenth of April, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, is hereby repealed: Pracided, That persons produced in court for examination as provided by this act, shall be entitled to the same fees as are now allowed witnesses attending upon the courts of this Commonwealth, to be paid by the the petitioner or remonstrants, or some of them, as the court may direct.

Section 2. That hereafter licenses to restaurants and eating-houses, shall not be granted by the county treasurer of any county, but such license, if granted, shall be issued from the court of quarter sessions of the several counties, on the same terms and under the same restrictions and regulations as are applied to inus and taverns, and all acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this section, are hereby repealed: Provided, This act shall not apply to the city of Philadelphia. alth.

State Banks and Foreign Currency.

Do the first of July, all notes of State Banks in circulation will be subject to a Government tax of ten per cent. Of course they will all be forced out of circulation by that time. In the mean time, notes from other States and distant parts of our own State, may be brought there for circulation. THIRTY NINTH CONGRESS. FIRST SESSION.

WASHINGTON, April 16, 1866.—SENATE.—Mr. Wilson, from the Military Committee, reported his Militia bill. A disgraceful scene took place upon a charge by Mr. Conness that his celleague; Mr. McDongall, was not in a condition to know what he was saying. The Habical Corpus bill was considered.
