The Farmer. RAISE YOUR OWN CLOVER SEED

"Raise your own clover seed and sow it with an unsparing hand," like nearly all ag, icultural precepts, needs qualification. On wheat farm it is not easy to grow too much clover, provided it is all consumed on the arm, or plowed in as a green manure; bug is is quite easy to raise too much clover seed Clover is, perhaps, all things considered, its best renovating crop that can be grown on a wheat farm. Like peas and beans, clover is leguminous plant, and draws a considera. ble quantity of ammonia from the atmosphere, while its deep roots penetrate the sit. soil and bring up potash and other ingrate ents of plant food. It is admirably adapted to our climate, and as yet "clover sicktes, which is so troublesome on the light soils, England in known in but few localities h

this country. Whether it is best for farmers to take their own seed is a question which deserves, colosideration. We have urged them to do so because we think they will be more likely sow more it they have plenty seed or their own, than if they have to purchase. Bur it should be borne in mind that the main obiect of sowing so much clover is to enich the land, and it is undoubtedly true that ict ting clover go to seed changes it from a teles. vating to an exhausting crop. The onclusion is this: Clover is a great reno. vating crop when grown for hay, for pasture, or for plowing under, and should consequent y be sown liberally. On the other hand, raising seed is highly profitable, but some That exhausting to the land. Raise clare seed, but use the money obtained from its sale to enrich the land: A bushel of clove seed will usually buy six or eight busines of neas or beans, and these fed to stock on the

arm will restore to the soil, in the form of nanure, six or eight times as much plant ood as the crop of clover seed removed. Do not try to cheat the soil. Do not induce it to give you a good crop of clover seed, and then refuse it a share in the profits. In raising clover seed, cut the first can early-say in this latitude, the first or second week of June. It is also important that the first crop should be mown as evenly as in ;sible that the plants may start equally, and the future crop of seed ripen all at the same time. It is desirable to get the seed early, say the first or second week in September .-Occasionally a large crop will ripen in Octor ber: but at that season the weather is usually unpropitious, and a large number of the heads when ripe are apt to drop off in wet

ing season, the seed in this case is apt to ipen poorly. The largest crops are obtained, other things eing equal, from land seeded with nothing but clover and in this case the seed should be sown pretty thickly, say six or eight quare per acre. This thick seeding has a double advantage: You get a finer quality of ciover hay, and the plants being thick on the ground the plants are not so apt to lodge, and can be mown more evenly. Six bushels per acre is sometimes grown on good land then clover alone is sown, but three or icar oushels is a full average. The expense

rowing, harvesting, and hulling is very ... ile, and the seed is practically nearly all Let not the farmer who neglects and starves his land think that he can get rich by sowing. clover seed. The profits are not for him -There is no better indication of good land and good treatment than luxuriant crops of clover. The land that will produce good. clover will produce good wheat or other grain-and the negligent farmer neither de serves the one nor the other. Let him give the soil good tillage and liberal treatment, and it will prove grateful, but if he starves the soil the soil will starve him.

RHUBASH ROOTS AS "WISE PLANTS."-The Philadelphia Gardeners Monthly says that the pedlars of Linneous Rhubarb Roots under the cuphonious title of the "wine plant," have at last found some Pennsylvania farmers whose intelligence is too much for thene: Among the "Dutch" in Montgomery County, they gathered a rich harvest into their garners,—hundreds of farmers there are at this moment who are down on "book larnin," but who are in the holy hope of \$6000 per acre clear profit from their wine patches, from which pleasant dreams they will not awake until the decease of all their hopes about this time next year. Having well bled "the Dutch," they went down among the Quakers of Delaware and Chester counties, but they fell into the hands of the Philistines, and brought up in sadness in the County jail of Media. Three of the wise men of Binghamton were arrested for obtaining money under the false pretence of selling roots as "wine plants," knowing at the same time that they were nothing but rhubarb plants. After a hearing before the Alderman, they were handed over to the authorities of Media "to do with them as seemed good unto them."—When they get out we lancy they will give

You can boil the sprigs of spruce fir in place of the essence. SIRUP OF CURRANTS. - Pick ripe currents, and put them into a stew-pan over the fire, so that they get hot and burst; press them through a sieve, and set the liquid in a cool cellar for thirty-six hours; then strain it through cloths, sweeten with loaf sugar, and bottle for use. The juice of cherries and raspherries may be prepared as above. The

sirup, mixed with spring water, makes a refreshing summer drink. ORANGEADE. - Roll and press the juice from the oranges in the same way as from lemons. It requires less sugar than lemonade.
