The shipments are heavy again, and the increas ed supply this year goes far beyond the expectations of the most sanguine. It also shows how rapidly the consumption of coal is increasing. No person supposed that the market would take over a million and a half tons increase this year over the last, but from present appearances it will be nearly two and a half million tons. The Bitnminovo Coal Trade has also increased considerably, particularly in the Maryland Region. We would be under obligations if our Broad Top correspondent would send us the report of Broad Top shipments regularly every week, to

make our table complete. In making up our coal statistics about three weeks ago, an error occurred of about 90,000 tons It was in a report received from the Pennsylvania Coal Company, giving 98,000 tons instead of 9,800 tons. A friend very kindly called our attention to it, and we have ferrited out the error and corrected it. The table is now correct. As some cf the returns are made monthly and others weekly. there will always be found some little discrepancy compared with last year in the weekly reports. NEW COAL BREAKER—REVOLUTION IN THE COAL Business. R. A. Wilder, Esq., exhibited to us a few days ago, a model of a Coal Breaker which he has patented. This Breaker, it is believed by Mr. Wilder, and several who have examined it, will save at least 10 per cent of the present loss in preparing coal over the present plan adopted in this region. The estimated loss in the preparation of Anthracite Coal sent to market this year-say housand words were transmitted in twelve hours on ten million tons, will average 20 per cent, and a saving of 10 per cent on that quantity would amount to \$2,500,000, a very important feature

both to landholders and Coal Operators. The parties who have charge of the Biesker propose erecting them at the Shipping Ports, and in the yards of Coal Dealers in the cities and towns where the Coal is sold. This will create a complete revolution in the Coal Trade.— The Coal will then be shipped as it comes from the mines, cleansed of all impurities, and broken at the shipping ports, or in the yards of dealers, s may be desired. The Coal Operator will not require over one-half the expensive machinery now required at Collieries to prepare Coal, and the mountains of dirt, &c., now piled up by the preparation of Coal at Collieries, will be diminished at least three-fourths in quantity. All that will be required will be a platform on which the coal will be dumped, and then cleaned and transferred to a revolving Apron to the schute leading to the ears, which Mr. Wilder has also invented. Mr. Wilder's Breaker does not grind the Coal and conacquently but little dirt below the size of Per Coal is made. If made in the Coal Region it will not bear transportation to market, but if made in the market it can always be sold at cost. Even

this fine dirt mixed with a little Bituminous Coal can be used for fuel to run the Breakers. By breaking the Coal at the different shipping ports, and particularly in the yards of dealers in the cities, the sharp edges will be preserved which portant feature in the consumption of hard An and became a law, it provides that all soldiers | thracite. The Battin Breaker destroys nearly all these sharp corners and those preserved in passing through the breaker, are generally broken off in passing through the screens; but as Mr. Wilder's Breaker does not grind but break the Coal, they are preserved the same as if broken by hand; and he feels confident that by the introduction of perforated plates, he can separate the different sizes of Coal, and free it from dirt without the use of screens, by running it directly into schutes children or parents, in the order named, are from the breaker, which will convey it into the vessel at the wharves, or into carts at the Coal





But it may not be entirely out of place for me to state that at the commencement of this infquitous rebellion I was one who entired the service, not as a three-years man, but as one who entired for the war or during the struggle for the suppression of the rebellion; and I trust it will not be considered egostistical for me, on this occasion, to allude briefly to what was my position at the beginning of the rebellion.

Looking Up and Looking Down.—A correspondent of the Chicago Tribune, writing from Georgia, relates the following:




