THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION. The Cause of the Butchery in New Orleans. The Convention in Louisians was called ogether to deliberate on the adoption of Amendment to the Constitution passed by Congress in order to secure representation in longress. Booth President, who attempted but failed in Tennesses to prevent a quorum of the Legislature for its adopion, was so mortified at the result, that

he was determined that no Convention should assemble in Louisiana for such a purpose. Rank rebels were closeted with him in Washington who prevalled upon him to supersede the Governor of the State, and the opinions of the President were privately telegraphed to the mob of rebels at New Orleans by King, the editor of their organ there. This was the food upon which the mob fed, and when the passionate and incendiary despatches of the President were promulgated, the mob immediately caught them up and declared that the President was with them, and hence the massacre.

This Convention was regularly organized in 1864 by authority of President Lincoln; those parishes within the Union lines only were represented. 


