An Act to Preserve Game.—By the following Act passed at the last session of the Legislature, it will be seen that it is unlawful to kill rabbits and partridges in this County before the 1st of November. Sportsmen will govern themselves ac-

An Act for the Better Preservation of Game scitting the County of Schuylkill.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and Honse of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same: That from and after the passage of this act, no person shall kill or otherwise destroy, within the County of Schuylkill, any partridge, or rabbit, between the fifteenth day of January and the first day of November in the present year, and in each and every year thereafter.

Section 2.
