This commonly known. NITRO-GLYCERINE—WHAT IS IT?

This compound, more commonly known as blasting oil, is a pale, yellow, oily liquid of 1 6 specific gravity, insoluble in water. It does not explode by direct flame, and when exploded by a fuse or concussion leaves no residue. It explodes with great rapidity and force, and the discoverer claims that it can be kept an indefinite time without decomposition. A few drops, on an anvil detonates under the blow of a hammer, but the explosion is not communicated beyond the drop which receives the blow, and repeated blows.
