





GAS TAR FOR POSTS, &C.

The question of the efficacy of gas ar or coal tar, for posts, and other timber, exposed

The Hick portion of the tar, resembling resin in a rear ance, is extracted from the tar by distillating to be used for roofing purposes, while the llquid portion that remains, resembling spares f turpetine, and which goes by the name of reosote is that used for hop poles. The isual dimensions of the tank used for this

purpose, are three feet by ten feet more or ess, with perpendicular sides two feet in hight. The arch is built in the usual manner, with a chimney at the coal opposite the tire. place. The hop-poles, after being sharpen. ed ready for setting in the spring, are placed on end in this tank, supported by a france. some ten or twelve feet above, so that the poles stand upright in the pan, which is then filled with the creosote or gas tar. Ting about two feet of the hop pole is brilled until it is completely saturated. I have seen poles that had been in use seven years after b. ing. subjected to this treatment, which were anparently as sound as when first used. Refr. road ties are subjected to this process; only with them, the treatment is continued for a greater length of time. Fonce and telegra; h posts are served in the same manner. The rocess just mentioned is the most effective nethod of applying the creesore or far, al-

though many of the smaller hop-planters, probably from motives of economy, apply the quid several times in a heated state, until it cenetrates far into the wood. In preparing stakes for the horizontal fi p. ard, the best and most economical ones ste those sawed one and one fourth inches square and eight feet in length, for all except-the outer rows, which are large and strong --These stakes, after being sharpened at colleend, are laid lengthwise in the vat, and tookal in the tar or creosote for half an hour. The pan, if of the dimensions described, will had about enough to stake an acre. The expense when preparing for a yard of ten acres, will be less than one cent per stake.
