Building Associations.—As there are a number of building associations being organized in this County, for public information we give the following plan of one already organized in Clevelland, which is similar to that adopted here:

The association consists of two thousand shares. Each person who puts down his name for a share, person dollar a month, and if he takes more than one share, then he pays in the same proportion. This makes \$1,000 paid in every month, all which is to be loased out. Each share is entitled to begrow from the association \$200 and this sum of \$200 is called "a loan" meaning the precise sum of \$300.

all have equal rights to it, but the question is settled by that person taking it who bids the highest premium for the preference.

No person can take more than one loan for each share he may hold in the Society. Thus for instance, a mechanic has decided or buying a certain house and lot, and has no means of paying for it—he has, however, fire shares in the Association—the price of his house and lot is, say \$300 or \$1,000, his five shares entitle him to berrow \$1500, which is awarded to him at a regular monthly meeting. With this \$1,000 he is enabled to buy the property, and he gives the Society a mortgage for the amount, the interest of which mortgage he pays monthly with the regular five dollars on his five shares. Now the \$1,000 lent to him is never called for, for it has been found in all these building societies that the finads and profits accumulate so rapidly by means of the linterest and compound interest, which is perpetually paid in from premiums, dues and interest, that in a few years there is as much due him from the association as he borrowed from it, consequently his house is paid for, every dollar of it.

Therefore, when the shares of the society are found to be worth \$200, the borrower has his mortgage surrendered to him and the Association is dissolved. From States, it is found that these societies usually expire in about seven years.

TO THE UNITED STATES SENATE, And the House of Representatives in Congress assembled.

The Petition of the working Men of Schuylkill County, respectfully represent: That a large portion of us are out of work, and those who have employment are receiving wages which hardly keep our families from starvation—that this state of affairs has been mainly brought about by the want of adequate protection to American manufactures and industry, which has caused the stoppage of many factories, and thus checked the consumption of coal.

Your petitioners would respectfully state that your Honorable Body, the Senate, failed to act on the Tariff Bill which passed the House in July, 1866, and this measure was brought up at so late a period during the late session, that action on it failed again in the House.

Your Honorable Bodies very properly provided for the meeting of the Fortieth Congress, after the expiration of the Thirty-ninth; but we have learned with regret, that the Senate is not likely to accede to the proposition of the House, to meet again on the 8th of May, when all the Northern States will, no doubt, be represented to co-operate in completing the unfinished legislation of last session, which the state of the Country requires and absolutely demands. Congress has voted to their members a salary of \$5000 a year. This is a large sum compared to the former salary received by the members—but we would not chiect so much to this sum, if the Representatives of the people would legislate so as to protect us from the low labor, cheap money, established mammoth factories, and the immense quantity of labor-saving machinery now used in Europe, and particularly in England. Your petitioners would also remind Congress that it is the labor of the country that mainly creates the wealth of the country; and the revenues required to defray the expenses of government, pay the interest on its bonds and maintain its credit, depend upon properly rewarding labor, which not only increases wealth,
