TAKING UP TREES .- An enormous amount f money is annually lost to tree purchases rom rude and unekilful taking up. Trees are torn up by the roots, as if the trunk and branches were the only thing necessary, and the roots superfluous. The proper way is to open a trench on each side of the tree with ommon spade, keeping the edge towards the ree, so as not to cross a root. These trenche should be far enough from the trees to avoid the main roots, and deep enough to go below all except the top root, which may be cut of.

This being done, the tree may be pulled up

with its root entire.

Recipes. CHRISTMAS CAKE. - One pound of sugar and one half pound of butter beaten to a from. Sprinkle over one teacupful of augar, a small teaspoonful of tartaric acid, and a teacup of cold water. Flavor with lemon. Pre Caust. - Take one pint of buttermilk. one large teacup of lard, one teaspoonful of

salt, one teaspoonful of saleratus, and flour enough to form a dough. Mix the lard and flour by rubbing them together; then add; the other ingredients, knead well, and it is ready to roll out. Tender and good. A GOOD JOHNNY CARE. -Some one asked for a receipt for making a good johnny cake: I occasionally make one after this rule : one cup of sweet milk, one cup of buttermilk or sour milk, half cup of molasses, one cup of flour, two cups of meal, one teaspoonful of

salt, one reaspoonful of carraway seed. Mix them all together, and bake quick in a hot? oven fifteen or twenty minutes. STRAIN THE BUTTERWILK .- Place a common wire sieve over a milk pail, and allow the buttermilk to flow into it, moving the strainng gently with a spoon from one side of the sieve to the other until the buttermilk is gone through. What is left makes excellent shortoning. It may be tried out by gently simmering till the sediment settles and the oil loats on the top. Where a great many cows

are kept the quantity of butter saved in this way is quite considerable. SCREWING ON NUTS.—We have sometimes know? nuts to be found so tight that no wrench would remove them. This was because they had been held in the hand till they became warm, and being then applied to very cold acrews, in ilia winter, they contracted by cooling on, and thus held the screw with an immovable grasp. Always avoid putting a warm nut on a cold screw. Toremove it, apply a large heated iron in contact will loosen at once. A cloth wet with boiling water will accomplish the same purpose

LEMON PUDDING -The juice and grated rind (rubbed on sugar) of 6 lemons, 1 pint of cream, 6 onners of bruked rataflas, 12 volks and the whites of 4 eggs whipped, } a nut meg grated, a little cinnamon-powder. 12 ounces of pounded sugar and a very little salt. Mix the above together in a large basin and work them with a whisk for about ter minutes. Next put a border of puff-paste round the edge of a tart dish, spread the dish with butter, pour the batter into it, strew some thred pistachio kernels on the top and bake it for about half an hour (at moderate heat.) When done shake some sifted sugar

CLAYEY Soirs. Coarse stable manures were

well in clayey soils, because they not only furnish the food of plants as they decay, but improve the physical texture of such solls, acting mechanical ly to lighten them up. You spread on a heavy lreesing of coarse, strawy, barnyard manure, and slough it in to the depth of seven or eight inches the first year. The next year you could repeat the process, ploughing now eight or nine inches the subsoil by each operation; and, though Joi may have to use some manure near the surface also, by following up this course two or thee years in succession, going a little deeper, you enrich the soil deepen, and improve it. Plough deep put down coarse manures and gradually work to subsoil up, eartching it from year to year by higher cultivation, put in clover and root cross and you may make about the best and most pro-

ductive soil that lies out-doors,

over it, and serve.
