

When a man takes great trouble and goes to some expense in preparing to exhibit stock or grain, or fruit or flowers, and then finds his articles slighted, and the premiums given to less deserving competitors, he field hurt, and perhaps resolves to abandon the Society and its exhibitions. Every year witnesses cases of this kind. And so it hap. pens that good contributors fall off every year, and their places are poorly supplied by new comers, or not at all. Not only do influential supporters drop off, but with their defection the quality of the exhibitions declines, and spectators go home every year declaring the Fair a humbug, not worth attending again.

Now, to avoid such troubles, it is import. ant, first of all, to secure good judges. They should be men above all mean and petty preindices and partialities, men thoroughly competent to decide on the merits of the articles presented before them, and who will givetime and thought to their examination -They should be the guests of the Society and be entertained, free of expense, dui ;

he Fair. The time for appointing the Executive Board who will select the Judges, is at the vinter meeting of the local Society. Let all the members attend this meeting, and see to that good and true men are chosen for cill. Then, let this Board give time and careful thought to the choice of Judges. The success of the Society will depend much on this. But when the Judges have been up. pointed, the exhibitor should thenceforth dismiss all suspicion of partiality, and take the decision of the Judges as given in good faith. Let us ever remember that we are apt to think more highly of our own articles than we ought to think. The Judges have to look on all sides of the case in order to re-der due justice to all parties. A five-acre field was named. We carefully planted and cultivated it, and found no rot among the potators, but the yield of the field did not supply the tables of the farm for the year, so exhausted was the land. In the Autumn we ployed an! sowed the same field with rye, twenty-five bushels of bone dust to the acre. Such was the immediate effect of the application, that when the rye was grown, a man of crdirary stature would be concessed by the crop in walking through the field. Grass seed was Bown with the rye. A good crop of hay was taken the first year it was moved. But the second year, when turf was well established, sixteen tons of hay were taken from the tive acres. After mowing it four years, it was plowed and planted to corn, giving a heavy crop without manure. Such is our experience in the use of bone as manure. Twenty to twenty-five bushels of bone is a good dressing to the acre, and it is worth from two to three times the cost of stable manure brought from the city.
