How Manufactubers Benefit Farmers.—Hon. D. J. Morrell has written a letter in reply to the question what amount of Western Agricultural produce the Cambria Iron Works, of which he is superintendent, now make a market for. He estimates the number of tons of rails produced by the Cambria Works for the year ending October 31, 1866, at 45,000, and the amount expended in living by workmen for each ton at \$65, making a total of \$2,925,000. Of this sum, \$1,650,780 were paid to Western farmers; \$319,050 to Southern farmers; \$371,800 to Pennsylvania and Eastern, and to foreign farmers \$175,500. Considerably more than half of the nearly three millions of one manufacturing establishment go into the pockets of American farmers, and more than twothirds of the sum which is distributed among the West. Had the rails made by the Cambria Works Cambria Iron Works paid more than half a million of dollars, would have been exported to England, and for that fifth the farmers of the West

would have received lower prices than were paid them by American mechanics. 



A short hoae is attached to this innee, terminating in a brass nozzle.— Turn on the faucet and from the cylinder jers out a volume of carbonic acid gas that instantly extinguishes flame, no matter how extreme its flerceress. At any rate this is what is claimed for it, and the experiments of Saturday showed the claim to be well founded within the attempt dimits. A series of tar barrelo filled with shavings and the dilng wood were piled up and set on fire. When the whole was wrapped in flames the jet of gas was turned upon the pile, and in an instant there was no more fire. The last experiment was the most conclusive. A frame building had been built, about ten by twelve feet equare and thirteen feet high. It was filled with combustibles and saturated ith coal oil The operator, with his cylinder upon his back, advanced to the structure when the whole was a mass of flame, turned on the stor-cock, and with a whiz from the nozzle the flames were extinguished. There must have been some hundreds of spectators present. The Fire warshal, nume-ous Counclimen and efficers of insurance companies viewed the patent, little apparatus and its operations with curious eyes.—The Chief Rangheer of the Fire Department could not be present.
