A REVOLUTION. Whatever may be the future course of President Johnson it is becoming daily more evi dent that there are influences at work in the South, which are creating a revolution in the sentiments of the people there. It would seem that they are awakening to their interests. They find that to selfish leaders and a stubborn President, they owe the fact that they are still unrepresented in the National Con gress. The leaders advised them to reject the Constitutional Amendment, and they would get better terms. President Johnson held out the hope that if they rejected the Amendment, he would in the event of the passage of the military reconstruction bill. veto it, and if it should be passed over his head he would refuse to execute it. This he

said to a Southern member of the late Congress, from the State of Alabama. Finding that instead of the comparatively mild terms of the Constitutional Amendment, they have to face the Sherman Reconstruction Bill, with the "Shellabarger Amendment" which denies admission to the more headstrong and recreant, and that there is no hope for return to peace, prosperity and citizenship, but through those measures, the people appear to be accepting it in all quarters. Every day seems to add strength to the movement. The Jury Law for Schuglkill County.—At the late session of the Legislature the following Act was extended to this County, and is now a law AN ACT for the better and more impartial selection of persons to serve as jarors in the several courts of Somerset, Bedford, Fulton, Westmoreland, Perry, Junists counties duniata counties.
Storion I. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa ivea of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is bereby enacted by the authority of the same. That at the general election, to be held on the second Tuesday of October, Anno Domial, one thousand eight bundred and sixty five, and triennially, thereafter, at such election, the qualified electors of the counties of Somerset, Bedford, Fulton, Perry, Junista and Westmoreland, of this commonwealth, shall elect, in the manner now rovided by law for the election of other county officers, two sober, intelligent and judicious persons, to serve as jury commis loners, in each of said counties, for the period of three years ensuing their election; but the same person, or persons, shall not be eligible for rejection more than once in any period of three years. Prayvord, That each of said qualified electors chall vote for one person only as Jury commissioner; and the two persons having the greatest number of votes for jury commissioners, shall be duly elected jury commissioners for each county.

Softon 2. It shall be the duty of said jury commissioners to meet at the seat of justice of the respective counties at least thirty days befure the first term of the court of common pleas in every year, and thereupon proceed, with due diligence, to select alternately, from the whole male taxabe citizens of the respective county at large, a sufficient number of sober, intelligent and judicious persons, to serve as jurors in the several courtes of such county during that year; and as soon as the said selection shall be completed, the said jury commissioners shall, in the mode and manner directed by law, place the names of the persons so selected in the proper jury wheel.
