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



If it was deemed advicable afterwards to withdraw the Government greenback currency gradually, the National Bank issue could be increased to take a list place up to the limit.

After a resumption of specle payments by the Banks, the people will, no doubt, desire a withdrawal of the notes of a less demonination than five dollars, and gold and silver will of course, replace it, which would give us all the metallic currency required. While these channels were filling up, the increased issue of paper currency could be suspended for a time.

With such a limit to the issue, while it provides for all currency could be suspended for a time.

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
