

LIQUID MANURES. Calcined bones dissolved in three times their weight of sulphuric acid, and mixed with one fourth of their weight of line, pounded charcoal and soot, in equal quantities, form a compound when diluted with wa. ter in the proportion of eight gallous to one gill of the mixture, which can scarcely be to a highly valued as a manure for general purposes. The liquid should not be allowed to touch the leaves. It is perhaps one of the very best manures for the Apple, Pear, Currant and Gooseberry. It exerts great inflaence over the parts of fructification, and produces an abundant crop of well flavored and luscious fruit.

Pigeon and hen durg, each separately, or both combined, form the basis of a safe and useful manure. Throw twelve quarts into a hogshead of water and agitate row and then for a few days, then add some liquid from the farm yard. Clear it by putting in a few quarts of quick lime. This liquid is valuable for the Strawberry, Grapevine and Peach trees.

Half decomposed cow and sheep manure when made into a liquid and cleared with lime, is very valuable for plants in the flower garden. A few applications produce a mark. Sulphate of ammonia—one pound not we soluble in water sufficient to cover it, and

afterwards diluted with a barrel of rain weter, in which two quarts of scot have been mixed, makes a very stimulating manure tor. cold, heavy soils. It should be applied in the evening, as it is liable to scorch the leaves Root crops and bulbs are benefitted by this manure to a remarkable degree; also asters and balsams. Guano and blood, whem mixed with pulverized charcoal and left stand in a close

BREWERS' GRAINS FOR MILCH COWS Mr. X. A. Willard, in the Utica Herald, says that the value of brewers' grains it. milch cows depends entirely on their cost in particular localities, when compared with other kinds of food. They increase the quantity rather than improve the quality of the milk, and when other kinds of food are. given, combined with the grain to make up hose qualities which are lacking, they may be used with good results. Cows, however which are fed largely on brewers' grains, are weakened in constitution, and hence it becomes an imperative necessity to find some highly nutritions food in conjunction with them, if regard be had to the health of the animal, to say nothing of adding to the inferior quality of milk resulting from their use. Experiments show that distillers grains do not contain substance yielding an abundant supply of caseine, but are better adapted for butter and sugar of milk. They may be Always prompt in paying and fair in adjusting their passes. Have paid over \$40,000 of losses in Schuylkill regarded as useful in keeping up a flow of milk, and where this is sought, they will be found perhaps more valuable than their nutritive qualities would seem to warrant -Cows are sometimes disposed to run fat, and fail in milk, when fed on highly nourishing food. In such cases, a moderate supply of of brewers' grains will be found to correct the difficulty, and thus they prove really valtable. The art of feeding to effect certain esults, is not closely studied by our tarmers. By understanding the nature of foods and . their economic use, one man will reach the same result at much less expense than he who has no definite idea of the material in his hands, beyond placing it before his stock .-The question of food is at all times an important one and especially to those who are ooking to the most profit from their use. CHARCOAL AS MANURE -We subjoin Prof. liebig's opinion on the above, than whom he better authority can be given:

"Charcoal surpasses all other substances n the power which it possesses of condensing ammonia with its pores, particularly when it has been previously heated to redness. It absorbs ninety times its volume of ammonial gas, which may be again ecparated by moistening it with water. It is by the virtue of this power that the roots of the plants are supplied in charcoal exactly as in humus, with an atmosphere of carbonic acid and air, which is renewed as quickly, as it is abstracted. Charcoal has a physical as well as a chemical effect on soils, which is decidedly useful. It renders them, as far as it is present, light and friable, and gives addition. I warmth to them by its color, as it retains readily the rays of the sun during the day. Wherever charcoal has been applied, rust never affects the growth of wheat and other

ereals." (From the National Agriculturist.) Bones as Manure -An experienced Agriculturist who has made a great many experiients with different manures and fertilizers, gives his opinion on bone manure as follows: It may be compared with the best stable manure; 1st, in respect to the quality of grain, as 7 to 5; 2d, in respect to quantity, 5 to 4; 8d, in respect to the durability of the energy of soils so manured, as 8 to 2. It possesses several collateral advantages; lst, it destroys weeds; 2d, it diminishes the necessity of fallow-crops; 8d, this concentrated manure, or substitute for manure, is more easy of conveyance, less laborious to spread, and can with facility be applied to he steepest lands, in very hilly countries, or n wet meadow lands; 4th, it renders agri-
