Iron plates several lines (twelfths of an inch) in thickness were broken to atoms by exploding fifteen grains of the substance upon them. It is named nitrate of diazobenzol, and is prepared by passing nitrous acid through a solution of aniline in four times its volume of alcohol, until the addition of ether precipitates the product in white acicular crystals. After being separated as much as possible from the solution, they are again taken up in cold dilute alcohol, and precipitated by ether in long white needles.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE MINEES JOHNAL—RIE:—I wish to correct an error indulged in by some of our risends in this County. That is, "that all the pneumatic steel made in Great Britain, is made from charcoal iron." This is not so. The only charcoal iron made in Great Britain at the present time, is that made by Messrs, Harrison, Ainalle & Co. They have four furnaces. Two in Cumberland, one in Luncashire, and one in Argyleahire, Scolland. They make a superior brand of "cold blast charcoal iron," that sells in the market for from £5 to £2 or £40 to £46 in gold her ton meetra, the two in Cumberland, one in Lancasnire, and one in Argyleahire, Scolland. They make a superior brand of "cold blast charcoal iron," that sells in the market for from £8 to £9 or \$40 to \$45 in gold per ton. This iron has a long established reputation, and is used mostly for making malicable castings, which is prepared direct from the metal melted in crucibles. You will observe that its price will not admit it to be made into pneuroatic steel.

Mr. Alien, of the Bessemer works, at Sheffield, told me that the only charcoal fron used in the pneumatic process, was that for making "tool steel," and that he could bay chasper in Hull, for there Swedish fron was sold for £6 or \$30 in gold per ton. The pneumatic steel makers of England can not afford to use charcoal fron for any other class of steel.

In the north of England they have a number of blast furnaces, engaged in making "hot blast coke fron," for the Bessemer works lot Sheffield and other places. Moreover, a first class quality of steel has been made from the anthracite iron of Gniscodwin, South Wales. Under those circumstances, we ought to have no difficulty in making good steel with the iron made from our rich magnetic ores of Berks and other counties. This is an advantage we have over them in England, for they have only a small quantity of primitive ores, and that have only a small quantity of primary of in Engof no account.

I understand that the experiments spoken of in England last summer, with the 'Siemens Farnace,' for preparing the iron to be made into puonmaic steel, has
been successful, so now it makes no difference what
coal we use. This I consider of the greatest importance to Schuylkill County, and other anthractic regions, with their thousands of tons of coal dirt.
