





VINES FROM GREEN CUTTINGS. This mode of propagating the grape—that s. by taking cuttings at midsummer, with a leaf attached, and placing them in a dampat. mosphere under glass, has been much condemned by some cultivators, as silording poor and weak vines. We have never been able to see why a good, well ripened vine, raised in this way, should be any worse than a midsummer layer, or than any other vine. The difficulty is, careless cultivators ere tempted to take small and poor wood. and to thrust their young plants into market before they have grown sufficiently or have properly ripened their wood-gnorant pur. chasers being deluded by low prices. On a rencent visit to the nursery of W BROWN SMITH, of Syracuse, one of the best cultivators in the country, he informed us that he never found any difficulty with his green cuttings, as he invariably adopts the practice of ripening the wood early in autuma of the first years (by withholding heat and moisture) and of giving them a second season's growth in all instances, before othering them in market. The plants which he showed us, managed in this way, were the specimens of strong, good vines, One difficulty in the way of the successful growth of young or newly set vines, f r fami. y supplies and for vineyards, is a want of sufficient intelligence on the subject among

When it is full plan cloth over the cucumbers, and a boar nicely fitted, over the cloth. A stone should be placed on the board to keep the cucumber under the pickle. PRESERVING GRAPES .- A corresponded writes as follows respecting his method of canning and preserving grapes: To can grapes make a syrup of a quarter of a pound of sugar for one pound of fruit Put the grapes whole into the scalding symp and skim them out soon, and let them partly cool; it prevents the berries from breaking; pour in a little hot syrup; then put a piece of paper in the can to cover the truit; then fil up with hot syrup, and scal.
