PROGRESS OF WOOLEN MANUFAC-TURES IN THE WEST. PROGRESS OF WOOLEN MANUFAC.

The first Exposition of the North-Western Woolen Manufacturers' association opened on Tesselly, August 4: at Chicaga, with over 1,500 fots or samples on vanibition, representing over eighty Western woolen mile. The samples of cloth delighted and surprised all who attended, as well by their variety, durability, inster, dish, and strength, as by the immber of mile they represented Their texture and workmanship was equal to those of the very best foreign cloths of the same styles, not to mention their freeders from the shortly which enters so largely, and disgreefully into the manufacture of what should be the more substantial varieties of imported cloths: The number of woolen miles in the seven States of Oble, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Wiccourly, lows, and Minnesota has increased from 209 in 1856 to 557 in 1968, the number of seets from \$16,18,749 to \$5,448,060. It is claimed that during this period Chicago, Detroit, and Milwankee have constantly proved butter markets for wool, freight, and extenses added, that Boston, New York or Philadelphia. Some estimates were also produced to show that the profits of manufacturing wool at the West would considerably exceed average Eastern profits in the same branch of industry.
