THE POOR HOUSE. We are creditably informed by those who know, that a number of persons who organ. ize strikes in this Region, are men who care but little about work themselves, and invariably go to the Poor House in the winter; are there supported by the people, and in the spring are turned out again to create difficulty. Some of these men are leaders in their districts in the Copperhead party. Only a few days ago, an Irishman was overheard telling a friend, that the families of some of these leaders, during the strike were drawing food for out door relief, and were really doing hetter than if they were at work. The Poor House has become a political machine with the Directors all of one party, and it is in this

way that the expenses of the Poor House have been run up to abour \$80,000 a year. which the hard-working tax-payers of the County have to pay. Some years ago the Poor House was used in a similar manner, and the expenses of maintaining the poor were run up to about \$40,000 a year; when Dr. Augustus Schültz, of Auburn, was elected a Director, who, together with another Director oppreed to the so-called Democracy, reduced the expenses of the Poor House about one-half, less than \$20,000 a year, and put up additional buildings during the period, while the paupers were better cared for than when the extravagance prevailed. Death of a Boldier.—Lieut. Wm. Taylor, late of Company. A. Forty-eighth Penna. Regiment; died at his residence in Port Clinton on the 13th instant. 
