We look with horror upon the retch Probst, who murdered a family, and execute him for his terrible crime. But after all it is a crime that does not affect society at large. It does not injure any person be-

youd the immediate unfortunate family. What is the magnitude of that crime, great as it is, to the crime of the judge on the bench who sims to corrupt the fountains of justice and who, while a guardian of Law, strikes a deadly blow at its majesty? What is Probat's crime to that of such a man? In its influence on public virtue it is far more. desolating, far more worthy of reprobation. We know not whether these judges can in consequence of the partizan efforts which would be made to prevent it, be impeached; but we contend that they merit it from the manner in which they have undermined public virtue and confidence in our highest Courts. When human slavery in this Republic was abolished, an immense evil was removed, but we are threatened with an irruption of corruption in consequence of the action of our superior Courts, which if allowed to sweep over us will min the country far more effectually than even blavery. We trust that when the Supreme Court reassembles with its new organization, one cf its first acts will be to remove its Prothonoand other officers

concerned in the manufacturing of voters in that office, by a process which has been condemned by Judges Read and Agnew, as ille-Should reform in this matter not be secured so as to protect the Court against itself, and the people against the repetition of such disgraceful proceedings as have lately been witessed, the people will insist upon a change in the naturalization laws. We believe they could be amended so as to satisfy any honest foreigner who wants to be naturalized, by simply requiring a registry of the name, residence and voucher for the applicant, to be prepared thirty days before an election, and published. Some such amendment will be absolutely necessary unless reform is secured and public confidence re-established in the Courts to which this business is confided.


