New Copper Coins.—The following is a description of the proposed new series of nickle copper coins, of the denomination of one, three and five dents, weighing respectively one and a half, three and five grains. On the Observe is an emblematic head of Liberty, with the word Liberty ince ired thereon, and surrounded by the legend "United States of America," and the year of coinage. The Recerse is an olive wreath (emblematic of peace) surrounding the Roman numerals I III and V, which indicate the denomination of the respective piecea. The specimens will compare favorably, in execution, with the coins of any other country, and reflect the highest reduced by Judge Kelley last spring, and provides for the discontinuance of the issue of one and two cent bronze pieces, and the ten cent fractional currency note. Provision is also made for the redemption in United States notes of all the issues of minor coinage, which will protect the community from the evils of a redundant coinage. A system of redemption for the minor coinage was infat urged in the samual, report of Directors of the Mint for 1967, and is renewed in the report for 1968. It is stated that improvements in the devices of the gold and sliver coinage has been a subject of consideration at the Mint for some time past, final action, however, being delayed on account of the proposition for the unification of the coinage, which, if adopted by this country, would require devices on the coinage distinctly different from those on the proposed new coins are to be made is the Pennsylvania nickle and Lake Superior copper, the union of which, in the proofs is of surprising "whiteness and beapity, distinct from aliver yet approaching it." 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
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
