REVISED CENSUS STATISTICS.—The latest revised tables at the Census Office shows the following aggregate population of the States, and organized Territories:

White 33,581,680; colored 4,879,235; Indian, 25,733; Japanese, 55; Chinese, 63,196; total, 48,549,987.

ABOUT THE WEDDING RING.—The wedding ring is put on the fourth finger of the woman's hand because, in the original formula of marriages, it was placed on the top of the thumb with the words "In the name of the Father," then on the next finger with the words, "and of the Son," and on the middle finger with, "and of the Holy Ghost," and finally on the fourth with the "Amen."

THE President Judges throughout the State will receive a salary of \$5,000 for the ensuing year, commencing the 1st day of June. The associate judges will receive in lieu of the salary now allowed by law five dollars for every day they may be employed in the discharge of their official duties.

MASSACHUSETTS.—The strength of the Masonic order in the United States, as reported by the Committee on Correspondence of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, aggregated as follows:

Number of Lodges, 7,495; members initiated during the last year, 41,936; total number of members in thirty-eight States and one Territory, 466,892.

THE act passed by the Legislature at the last session changing the time of holding borough and township elections from October to March, has not yet been signed by the Governor, or at least it is not published with the general laws passed during the session of 1871.

THE bill was passed through both Houses unanimously, and no doubt was entertained of its receiving executive approval. It is possible it may have been overlooked and will be signed and published in the pamphlet laws before the October election.

DAGUECAHONDA RAILROAD.

From and after Monday, May 29th 1871. Trains will run on this road as follows:

Leaves Early 7.10 a. m., arrives at Daguecahonda Junction 7.45 a. m., connects with Local east 7.56 a. m., and Mail west 9.50 a. m. Leaves Daguecahonda 10.20 a. m., arrives at Early 11.00 a. m. Leaves Early 4.00 p. m., arrives at Daguecahonda 4.50 p. m., connecting with Mail east 5.05 p. m., and Local west 5.21 p. m.

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OTHER COUNTIES.

CLAREFIELD. Suicide.—Our villagers were startled on Sunday morning by the announcement of the sudden death of Joseph Burchfield, one of the leading carpenters and builders of this place.

ERIE. Burned to Death.—Ellen Lehan, a little seven-year-old step-daughter of Patrick Leany, living near the Lake Shore Railroad track, about one hundred rods west of the North East depot, was fatally burned last Thursday.

WARREN. Burglaries in Warren.—The Jewelry Store of Mr. Otto Huber was entered by prying open the back door last Wednesday night. The door of the new Marvin safe was blown open by drilling a hole and inserting powder just over the knob.

CLANDESTINE MARRIAGES.—The act in relation to clandestine marriages, passed by the late Legislature, was signed by the Governor on the 24th of June, and is therefore a law. The act provides: That no justice of the peace, clergyman, minister, or other person who shall take upon himself to perform the marriage ceremony, shall be liable for the penalty for joining in marriage persons under the age of twenty-one years, as provided in the second section of an act, entitled "An act to prevent clandestine marriages," approved February fourth, Anno Domini one thousand seven hundred and twenty-nine, unless such justice of the peace, clergyman, minister, or other person performing the marriage ceremony, shall, at the time of joining them in marriage, knowingly or willfully perform such marriage ceremony in disregard of the provisions of the first section of the act aforesaid.

How to DO UP SHIRT BOSOMS.—We have often heard ladies express a desire to know by what process the fine gloss observed on new linens, shirt bosoms, etc., is produced, and in order to gratify them, we subjoin the following recipe for making gum arabic starch: Take two ounces of gum arabic powder—put it into a pitcher, and pour on it a pint of boiling water (according to the degree of strength you desire), and then, having covered it, let it set all night. In the morning pour it carefully from the dregs into a clean bottle, cork it, and keep it for use.
