Postmasters of the smaller offices throughout the country are somewhat of an annovance to the Government. A large majority of them are constantly resigning their positions, becoming dis satisfied with the emplaments of postmasterships, and, consequently, rendering a change necessary, when the usual method of preparing the papers for candidates has to be re-concted. The average number of appointments of the above class throughout the year is about thirty a day.

UNITED STATES SENATE-AMOUNT OF APPROPULATIONS REQUIRED FOR 1873 .- The estin ates of appropriations required to meet the expenses of the United States Senate for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1873, have just been prepared by the Secretary of the Senate The amount called for is \$658,990. This included the salaries and mileage of Senators, clerical force of the Senate and other expenses. The estimates for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1872 are \$7,000 less than for a like period in 1872, but would have been \$10,000 but for the fact that a Senate Librarian has been recently appointed at a salary of \$2.200 and an assistant engineer at 31,400.

THE amount of aid to Chicago from foreign countries is much greater than could have been anticipated. Indeed, almost every part of the civilized world seems to be anxious to do its share for the relief of the devastated city. Montreal hos sent \$102,000 in gold, and the rest of Canada probably as much more. From Havana comes a contribution of over \$10,000 in gold. The contributions in Great Britain must exceed one hundred thousand pounds or a half million dollars in gold. Germany, Belgium. Switzerland, France and other countries have all contributed according to their means, and it may be fairly estimated that the whole amount given by foreigners will reach a million of dollars. This is a handsome return for all that America has done for foreign countries that have suffered from fire, war, pesti-Lence and famine.


