HOT CAKES.—A griddle for baking cakes should never be greased, as apart from the annoyance caused by the smoke arising from a greased griddle, the delicate flavor of the cakes is destroyed. Soak well with a cloth and sand, wash with hot suds, wipe dry, and just before baking rub with a coarse cloth and salt. It is not necessary to wash and scour it every time it is wanted; only once to get all the grease out; but use the cloth and salt every time you put fresh cakes on, just as grease would be used.
