PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF PENN'A. JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an amendment to the Constitu

tion of Pennsylvania. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment of the Constitution of this Commonwealth be proposed to the people for their adoption or rejection, pursuant to the provisions of the tenth article thereof, to wit;

AMENDMENT: Strike out the sixth article of the Constrike out the sixth article of the Constitution, and insert in lieu thereof the following: "A State Treasurer shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the States, at such times and for such term of service as shall be prescribed by law."
