The owners or lessees of the building in which the liquor is sold may also be held liable for all damages sustained and for exemplary damages, and the unlawful sale of liquor shall work a forfeiture of all rights of the lesee or tenant under any lease or contract. Justices of the Peace are to have jurisdiction in trying cases under the act when the damages claimed do not exceed determine the case.
