
freemen, citizens of the United States, If any person shall prevent or attempt to prevent any officer of any election un-der this act from holding such election, who are between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-two years, and who have resided in the election district ten days or use or threaten any violence to any as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote, such officer, or shall interrupt or inproperly interfer with him in the execution of his duty, or shall block up the window or avenue to any window where the same may be bolding, or shall riotously disturb the peace at such election or shall use or practice any intimidation threats, force or violence, with design to influence unduly or overawe any elec-tor, or to prevent him from voting, or to restrain the freedom of choice, such persons on conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding five hundred dollars, and be imprisoned for any time not less than one months or more than one years and if it be shown that the persons so offending was not a resident of the city, ward, district or township where the said offence was committed, and not entitled to vote therein, and on conviction he shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than one hundred more than one thousand dollars, and be imprisoned not less than six months or more than two years.

WHEREAS, By the act of the Conress of the United States, entitled "An Act to amend the several acts heretofore passed, to provide for the enrolling and calling out the national forces, and for other purposes," and approved March third, one thousand eight hundred and regulation of any State or Territory, or sixty-five, all persons who have deserted by or under its authority, to the contrary, the military or naval service of the United States, and who have not been discharged, or relieved from the penalty,

or disability therein provided, are deemed, and taken, to have voluntarily relinquished, and forfeited, their rights required to be done as a prerequisite or of citizenship, and their rights to become qualification for voting, and by such citizens, and are deprived of exercising any rights of citizens thereof :

> And whereas, Persons, not citizens of the United States, are not, under the constitution and laws of Peonsylvania, ualified electors of this commonwealth : SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same. That in all elections hereafter to be held in this commonwcalth, it shall be unlawful for the judge or inspectors of any such election to receive any ballot, or ballots, from any person, or persons, em-braced in the provisions. and subject to the disability, imposed by said act of Congress, approved March third, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and it shall be unlawful for any such persons to offer to vote any ballot, or bal-

SECTION 2. That if any such judge nd inspectors of election, or any one of them shall receive, or consent to receive, any such unlawful ballot, or ballots, from any such disqualified person, , or they, so offending, shall be guilt of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this commonwealth, he shall, for each offence, be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, and to undergo an imprisonment, in the jail of the proper county, for not less than sixty days. SECTION 3. That if any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, shall, at any election, hereafter to be held in this commonwealth. vote, or tender to the officers there, and offer to vote, a ballot, or ballots, any person, so offending, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this commonwealth, shall for each offence, be punished in a like manner as is provided in the preceding section of this act, in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful bal lot or ballots. SECTION 4. That if any person shall hereafter persuade, or advise, any person, or persons. deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, to offer any ballot, or ballots, to the officers of any election, hereafter to be held in this commonwealth, or shall persuade
