LETTER FROM OHIO.

CINCINNATI, OHIO, November 16, 1873.

DEAR ADVOCATE:—The Ku-Klux case in our neighboring city of Covington was disposed of yesterday. The examining court, composed of two Justices, could not agree, and the defendants were discharged. It is a prominent and peculiar feature of the decision, that the Justices in favor of binding over the accused is a Democrat, while the other is a Republican and voted to discharge. I am of the opinion that the wretched character shown by the prosecuting witness, even by himself on cross examination—his wife being the only corroborating witness, and she, it was shown was in terror of her husband, having been frequently beaten by him—would, in itself, justify any jury in acquitting the defendants; without paying any regard to the very positive recognizing he made—or says he made—of the parties at the time of the alleged raid, or in the court house, I don't exactly mean that if he were not Ku-Kluxed, that she could have been; but I do mean that a little tar and feathers would very well become him. Some ten years ago he was indicted for an outrage on his sister-in-law, and escaped the penitentiary only because the unfortunate woman died before his trial would have been held. I very well believe that many cases of Ku-Kluxism occur in the Southern States; but many cases are also trumped up, and this case was one of the latter kind. I was in Court during the trial, and think if all Ku-Klux were as well looking men and showed as good characters as these were did, a little infusion of them every where would work no great harm. Understand me, I am speaking only of the merits of the case in our own neighborhood; and hot by any means, palliating outrages whether done in the name of Kentucky Ku-Klux, or Indiana Vigilants.

THE PANT. has, apparently taken up permanent quarters with us. Hard times get harder every day, and no prospect of a speedy "let up." One day last week the Enquirer published in its "Male Help Wanted" column three hundred and fifty six applications for work of any kind. This was undoubtedly an extra day; but while fifty "wants" a few weeks ago would have been considered a large number, the papers, now, seldom have fewer than from two to three hundred. The Italian Opera Troupe has ordered its engagement here and in Chicago to be cancelled; the agent says no one will buy reserved seats, and very few will take any kind at all. In a musical place as this is, such a determination is an ominous evidence of the hardest times. The resumption ordered by Sec. Richardson has worked no great wonders here; indeed folks would not growl at being subjected to even a green-back resumption.

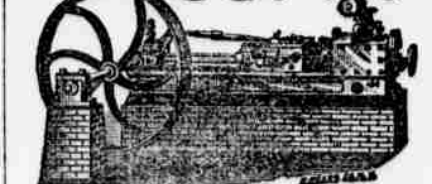
